Sundays are the most popular days for teens at the Y. A typical Sunday will keep a teenager jumping for six or eight hours - have him (or her) meeting new people, working or playing at sports or games, dancing, singing - and going home as tired and happy as a teen's ever been.

## Production Workshop Tryouts For Teen-age Actors Nov. 6, 13

Production Workshop, the performing theatre group of the Y Children's Drama Department, will hold tryouts for new members in the Studio Theatre (one flight down opposite the elevators) on Wednesdays, November 6 and 13 between 4:00 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. The Production Workshop offers young players (ages 8 through 16)

the opportunity to perform in a full-scale production which will be presented in the Y Studio Theatre for a series of performances in the spring.

"We are particularly looking for talented teen-age performers", said Miss Sharon, Director of the Children's Drama Department.

"Our plans for this season's plays are unusual as well as challenging. We will present a play of the Commedia Dell'Arte period either by Goldoni or by Gozzi as well as a modern melodrama using mime techniques. Both projects require young actors who can move well and who enjoy slapstick comedy so necessary to the playing of comedy Italian Style. The Workshop is unusual because of its age range and some of our best performers have been the younger members."

In past seasons, Production Workshop has presented Shake-speare's A Midsummer Night's Dream, a musical The Prince Who Learned Everything Out of Books with original music by Irma Jurist a well-known song satirist and composer who teaches in the Children's Drama Department, and Emil and the Detectives.

Emil and the Detectives, the longest running hit, was first presented in the Studio Theatre three seasons ago. It was so successful that The Pocket Players, a professional theatre company performing for children, produced the play off-Broadway.

"The detectives are still played by children who are members of Production Workshop," says Miss Sharon, also Artistic Director of The Pocket Players, "but the adult roles are now being performed by professional actors. Three of our original children's cast - Jeffrey Friedman, Michael Pressman and Nina Hellman — are still in the present cast of Emil. Jeffrey Friedman who plays the leading role of Emil, has developed into a first

Emil will be touring through February and will be playing at the McMillan Theatre in New York and at the Brooklyn Academy of Music.

Reflecting about the past productions of the Workshop, Miss Sharon added that the Production Workshop has always been successful because of its members. We have always had members who worked hard and who know that to put on a play has little to do with learning lines . . . teamwork is an important factor. Jessica Walters who played on Broadway last season in Photo Finish and will soon be seen in Robert Rossen's film Liluth was a former Workshop member as well as Maria Tucci, presently acting in Corruption in the Palace of Justice now playing at The Cherry Lane.

Miss Sharon believes that young people should not be in plays just to have fun because they are on a stage, but to enjoy themselves by working seriously in something

they love.
"I have never tried to make professional actors of my students," she concluded. "We have always worked as devoted amateurs as did musicians of the 18th century. I believe if professional actors could enjoy themselves as much as can young people who love what they are doing, we might have better performers in our theatre.
